Rain Barrel Percussionists Win "Most Humorous"

Greenbelt MD, 2 September 2013: The all-volunteer Greenbelt Precipitation Preservation and Percussion Society (GPP&PS) was awarded "Most Humorous" by the 2013 Labor Day Festival. The team created a percussion ensemble including a lawn sprinkler tambourine, a rain stick made from a downspout, a didgeridoo made from PVC plumbing, and a steel watering can, all rhythmically steadied by a thundering 55-gallon rain barrel mounted on their human-propelled parade float.

The team, dressed in a rainbow of colors, provided a 2-minute performance at several intersections along the parade route and at the judges' reviewing stand.

GPP&PS promotes on-site storage of precipitation in rain barrels. Water stored in your rain barrel is water that won't run off into our streams. Instead, as you use the stored rainwater around the home and garden, it will absorb slowly into the ground replenishing groundwater supplies. By decreasing storm runoff, rain barrels moderate erosion and reduce pollution in our lakes, rivers, and the Chesapeake Bay.

Chris Colvin coached the team on rhythmic percussion to ensure the result wasn't a cacophonic hail of noise. "I've worked with many drummers, but never quite like this." Amy Swackhamer, who played sheet metal to create thunder during the performance, said "The Society is precisely the sort of thing that seems to happen in Greenbelt." Beth LeaMond, who played the bass barrel along the parade route, said "I love music and frontier-style environmental preservation—this was a great way to combine two of my passions!" Dorian Winterfield played a 5-gallon bucket with drumsticks and said "Greenbelt is such a supportive community that anyone can find a place to shine, even with homemade instruments." Stephen Duda, 9 years old, played the role of the flower that blooms when the rain barrel channels the

rainfall, and added "I get so upset when water is wasted." His father, Alan Duda, noted "I learn something new from this Society every year.

I didn't know barrels were primarily to prevent runoff, and preserve water as a bonus."

Other Society members were Frank DeBernardo, Johanna Goderre Jones, Tom Jones, Luisa Robles, and Karen Wallace.

To support the environmental benefits of rain barrels, Greenbelt Homes Incorporated (GHI) has a Rain Barrel Purchase Program that buys in bulk for lower prices; call $301-474-4161 \times 143$ for more information. Prince George's County also has a rebate program providing up to \$100 to those installing rain barrels storing at least 100 gallons, and up to \$2,500 to those creating a rain garden.
